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Executive summary

Future Hepburn

Future Hepburn is a large strategic planning project. It will develop structure plans for the townships of Creswick, Clunes, Daylesford and Hepburn Springs, Glenlyon and Trentham. These plans will describe the desired outlook for the future of each township. They will outline how to protect the character of the townships and ensure appropriate growth into the future.

Purpose of the engagement

The voices of the community are integral to the planning process. Communities have lived experience, understand the changing environment and have opinions on the future of their townships. Community engagement provides local knowledge that is key to the planning process.

The engagement approach

The engagement process for the Trentham Structure Plan provides two opportunities for community members to have their say. Specifically:

- Phase One Initial community engagement (this phase)
- Phase Two Deeper community engagement.

This report provides an overview of the engagement process and the results of phase one of this process.

Participation

A total of 96 responses were analysed for this report including:

- 27 people who attended a Community Conversation engagement session
- 69 responses to the Trentham Structure Plan online survey.

Results

Across the engagement activities there were key elements of strong agreement principally that community members:

- Value the rural character, heritage, connection to the environment, community and lifestyle.
- Would like to see better environmental sustainability, better protection and enhancement of heritage and better transport connections.
- Believe Trentham can make better use of its natural environment and the trails around the town.
- Are cautious about growth and feel that the development of the town needs to be managed to ensure it does not change the fabric of the town



Some community members raised concerns that a lack of growth was not sustainable.



Engagement process

Purpose of the engagement

The Trentham Structure Plan is a significant project. It will guide how Trentham looks and feels over the coming decades. The direction the plan takes will have an impact on the current and future Trentham community. The lived experience and views of community members provide a critical knowledge base for the development of the plan. In addition, it provides an opportunity for planners to meet community members and discuss how a structure plan is developed. This helps to improve community understanding of the planning process and might lead to deeper engagement in the future.

The 2020 Local Government Act (The Act) outlines how communities must be engaged in decisions that affect them. The purpose of this engagement is not only to meet the requirements of The Act but move beyond that, to engage in dialogue with local communities to make informed decisions about the future of Trentham.

The engagement approach

The engagement process for the Trentham Structure Plan has been designed to give community members a range of opportunities to comment throughout the development of the plan. The initial stages of the engagement focused on broad ideas. A series of 'Conversation Starters' were developed on a range of subjects. Community members could then talk to planners at a 'Community Conversation'. In addition, an online survey led respondents through a series of questions related to planning and their experience of living in and around Trentham. The information collected during this proves will be used in developing the Draft Trentham Structure Plan.

Phase two of the engagement will involve a deeper deliberative process where community members will meet and discuss the outcomes of phase one of the community engagement process.

The results of both phases will be used in the development of the Draft Trentham Structure Plan. Once the structure plan is developed there will be further opportunities for community members to make comment.

Results in detail

Online Survey

Background

A specific Trentham Structure Plan online survey was live between 17 May 2023 and 2 July 2023. The questions asked related to key elements of a structure plan. This provided detailed community sentiment on a range of issues that will be addressed by the structure plan.

Participation

The survey received 69 responses which represents 4.9% of the population of Trentham. Most respondents (72%) live in Trentham. Most responses came from people aged 20-79 years with the largest percentage of responses coming from people aged between 60-79 years (79%). A total of 40 women and 25 men completed the survey. Full demographic details of survey respondents can be found in appendix one.

Results – survey

The results of the survey are presented below. Questions relating to individual places are not included in this summary report but can be found in the addendum of results.

Quantitative results have been broadly themed. Where a response mentions multiple themes, it is included with the first theme mentioned. Questions with limited answers have not been themed.



General results

1. What do you like or value about Trentham?

Respondents could choose as many statements as they liked and provide comments if they wished. The most cited comment was 'The rural character' which was cited by 58 respondents.




Other comments

Other comments reiterated the value placed on the small, quiet town, the access to services, farming and the environment.



2. Is there anything you think should change?

Respondents could choose as many statements as they liked and provide comments if they wished. The most cited comment was 'better environmental and sustainability outcomes' which was cited by 40 respondents.



Other comments

Other comments related to concerns over the impact of Airbnb and its impact on housing affordability. The need for more services, better control over housing development and protection for farm zones and control over the 'Europeanisation' of the landscape.

3. Is there anything that should not change?

Respondents were invited to answer this question in their own words. Their answers have been themed.

Character (13 responses)

The most cited responses referred to the 'character' of Trentham. This includes the streetscapes, connections to the environment and farming, buildings and the general 'rural' feel of the township.

Size and development (5 responses)

Several comments related to the size of the town and maintaining the current boundaries. There were also comments relating to managing development and subdivisions.



4. How would you like Trentham to be in the future?

Respondents were asked to rate the importance of six statements. The statement that received the highest score was 'more protection for wildlife and bushland areas'.



5. Do you have any concerns about the future of Trentham?

Respondents were invited to answer this question in their own words. Their answers have been themed.

Growth (31 responses)

Most comments related to growth and development. This included the amount of growth and the type of growth. Concerns that Trentham would become 'suburban' or that block sizes were too small to maintain the character of the township were common. The lack of perceived control over this growth and developer led growth was also a concern. Providing sufficient infrastructure and services for new development as well as the potential negative impact on the environment was also mentioned.

No growth (3 comments)

A few comments related for the need for some growth to allow the town to develop and increase housing supply.

Other

Other comments related to a fear that the large chain shops would be allowed into the town and the impact of too many tourists.

6. Other comments




Respondents were invited provide any additional comments about Trentham and the Trentham Structure Plan. The comments were varied with no clear themes however a number of concerns were raised:

- o Small blocks changing the character of the township
- o Lack of services and infrastructure
- Lack of affordable housing
- o A need to develop tourist opportunities
- o A need to manage the impact of tourists on the township
- o A need to maintain the rural feel of the township.

8. Reflecting on your last response, how could this be improved? Growth and subdivisions (12 comments)

There is significant resistance to growth and subdivisions from a proportion of respondents. The size of blocks is a concern for some people as are larger developments. Some respondents favour no additional housing and no subdivision to maintain the large block size.

A variety of housing options (11 comments)

Several respondents commented on the need for a range of housing options to accommodate community members at various stages of their lives. Houses suitable for older adults, single people and single parents was mentioned.

Good development (4 comments)



Short term accommodation (3 comments)


The impact of short term rentals and weekenders was a concern for some respondents.



9. How concerned are you about the affordability of housing in Trentham




10. Thinking about the next 15 years do you see yourself






11. What do you see as the most significant housing needs for your community?




12. If Trentham were to grow where should the housing occur?





15. What would make Trentham more attractive for business?




16. What is important for businesses located in Trentham?






17. What areas are suitable for industrial or commercial uses, trades, farm supplies and similar businesses?

20. Tell us where or how cycling facilities could be improved


Comments related to completing the rail trail and improving cycling safety.

Environmental issues

24. Are there areas in your town that you think should not be improved due to biodiversity, flooding or other environmental constraint?

Respondents were invited to answer this question in their own words and the responses have been themed.

Creeks and floodplains (21 responses)

The most cited areas related to creeks and floodplains. There were comments relating to houses that have already been built on floodplains and the flooding risk this created. There was also a desire to maintain the waterways.

Areas close to State Forest (4 responses)

Building close to the state forest was not supported for the potential damage to the environment and biodiversity and due to the fire danger.

The Town Centre

There were a few comments relating for the need to preserve the town centre from development.

Respondents were invited to answer this question in their own words and the responses have been themed.

Wombat state forest (6 comments)

Wombat State Park was an important area to protect including areas abutting the park.

Creeks (5 responses)

Creeks including Stoney and Trent Creeks were considered important.

Wildlife routes and refuges (4 comments)

Maintaining wildlife refuges and movement routes was important to help maintain existing wildlife.

Bushland (4 comments)

Bushland is considered important for wildlife and human wellbeing. Maintaining most or all existing bushland was considered important.

The town centre including the streetscape, older buildings and shopfronts.


Cosmopolitan Hotel (14 comments)







32. What is it about your local area that is important to you and the overall character, amenity and feel of your neighbourhood?










39. If you reside in or own a property in the Shire in which ward is that located?





Pop—up engagements

Background

A 'Community Conversation' was held on 31 May 2023 . The purpose of this was to provide community members the opportunity to both have their say and ask questions about the structure planning process.

Participation

A total of 27 people participated in the Community Conversation. The pop-ups were attended by people aged between 20 and 80+ years with the largest percentage of responses coming from people aged 60 - 79 years. A total of 14 women and 13 men completed the activity.

Results

The comments gathered have been reviewed and themed.

What is the one thing you love about Trentham?

The most cited comments related to:

- Access to nature such as the forest, wildlife, trees and Trentham falls
- Rural small town such as the large blocks, gardens, friendly community and 'country feel'

Other comments related to the streetscapes, services and facilities, heritage buildings, views and space.

What is the one thing you would change, remove or improve in Trentham?

There were a range of comments with no clear consensus on how Trentham should change. The most cited comments related to:

- Over development and the need to minimise subdivision
- The need to create walking and cycling trails

Other comments related to parking, the impact of tourist, available shopping options, housing the need for a youth space, play spaces and parks.

What type of businesses and services would you like added in Trentham?

The most cited business was 'trades and industry' which was noted as increasing employment opportunities. Other business that people indicated they would like to see include:



- Health services
- Childcare service
- Farm businesses
- Retail
- Food business
- Residential aged care
- News agent.

What sort of housing does the town need?

A range of housing types was mentioned. In order of most mentioned:

- Smaller houses suitable for singles, couples and smaller families
- Smaller affordable housing
- Social and affordable housing
- Accessible housing for older adults or people with a disability
- New home sites
- Large family houses
- Suitable housing for smaller blocks.

Only one person indicated that the town does not need additional housing.



Appendix one – online engagement results

The results in this appendix are provided exactly as the appear in the survey. They have not been edited and may contain typo's, inaccuracies and strong opinions.

Where a large number of comments have been made, they have been broadly themed for ease of reading. Note that the theme will refer to the main point made, and the comment may include additional themes.

Not all questions allowed free text comments, these have not been included in the question numbers. The question numbers refer to the survey question number.

General questions

The, mostly, healthy environment & seasons except for the smoke from wood-fired heaters.

2. Is there anything you think should change? Other comments

All the above need elaboration

a. Number of short stay accommodation (unregulated) b. Sun-division (inc axe-handle) of largish blocks into inappropriately dense lots.



Protection of the farm zone to ensure that any development actually supports farming and that farming activities aren't undermined by lifestylers. Neighbourhood character restrictions to prevent brick veneer and metricon-style homes. Protection of the timber, weatherboard and redbrick fabric of the town's heritage. Also clear articulation of what modern styles suit the neighbourhood character such as the new shops on the corner of Market and Victoria Streets, or new houses at Owl Rise.

Green bins

Better control over rampant, poorly designed sub division of residential properties

Complete the proposed Railtrail from Woodend to Daylesford

Stop the euopeanisation of the landscape. ie Lyonville fake avenue of honour.

All power lines should be underground and the street scape of some shops in the centre of Trentham needs attention. There needs to be a walking path to the Trentham Falls. The speed limit in the shops area needs reducing to 40 kmh. A properly researched and funded streetscape needs to happen. The Shire has failed to deliver this in the past.

The rural 'village' feel.

The main street should be maintained as far as practicable both in terms of its physical appearance and its cultural aesthetic.

keep the natural environment - indigenous plants where ever possible

I would not like to see grand scale subdivisions to incorporate small residential blocks less than 1000sqm similar to other areas ie Gisborne, Wallan, Kilmore and the like. I would prefer to see larger lifestyle subdivisions of 1 acre lots to allow for town growth

The removal of heritage buildings and large trees.

We spend billions of dollars a year to travel to the other side of the world to marvel at history, heritage and culture. There needs to be a far more respectful and appreciative attitude towards Trenthams old and historic building. Use them as attractions for a historic cycling track. Pulling down the old sausage factory on beatties lane was one of the silliest things to do. It was iconic. The removal of historic trees from around Trentham needs to stop. You can't buy age and the grandeur and attraction they provide.

No more housing until infrastructure has been improved

Growth

Yes some of the subdivisions should not be happening and infill of multiple houses should not be happening

- "5. Concerns about the future:
- (i) managing future change and growth reviewing the Structure Plan every decade or more isn't sufficient and a real on-going partnership between Council and Community is needed to guide these changes; and
- (ii) we don't have a clearly articulated vision / statement of the genius loci or the means for achieving, monitoring and maintaining these."

The generic, growing too fast. Should have a minimum house block size

"Excessive housing development is a concern as the town risks loosing it's uniqueness. Better street drainage.

Facilities such as gym, doctors and childcare so young families can grow and stay in the area as well as the aging. To much focus on aging and not enough on the young families entering the town."

Yes I am concerned by the development and subdivisions taking place and that even after objecting to semi-detached units being placed in a backyard on the edge of Trentham, and the affect it will have on neighbours, wildlife and that it doesn't comply with regulations. Council still went ahead and approved it subject to some small changes, yet claimed at the town information session that they care about the Trentham survey and how the community feels.

Developers, small block sizes & battle axe blocks are dramatically changing the population & community feel. People moving to Trentham attracted to smaller blocks (often weekenders) are unrealistic about rural life. They are often not here during the week & want very different



facilities than permanent residents...we need more families to retain the community feel, support established services & clubs (& a pool of casual teenage employees) & they need family-sized homes not 350m blocks. Help us

Rampant subdivision and subsequent urbanisation on small blocks. Water. Fire access on limited roads

"Yes - fragmentation of farmland.

The loss of walkability and amenity provided by having cottages and small blocks/dwellings in close to the main centre of town. It would be a real shame if we made or allowed people to live further and further out and this increased the amount of car traffic and discouraged the amenity of a village which is easy to walk around and meet people in the street.

Also - loss of neighbourhood character because of inappropriate design and building materials being used."

Trentham can't really support much more development and population increase so I wouldn't like to see it grow any more. Movement of traffic through the town is becoming increasingly difficult and parking is a huge problem.

Inappropriate subdivisions, blocks too small for building footprint. Some inappropriate battle-axe developments

"Just to have it stay, just as it is now, and not be ruined like Gisborne, with so much traffic, it is impossible to find a park to go shopping. The school traffic is a nightmare also.

The infrastructure in Gisborne, is not coping with the explosion of new housing and people coming into the area.

When I lived there 7 years ago, it was a quiet, country town, with so much character."

Inappropriate expansion, leading to sprawl and limited healthy options for accessing all services, i.e. shops, school.

"Very concerned that what I love and value about Trentham will be forever destroyed by rampant subdivision which is poorly designed and not considered against the wider and longer term impacts on the physical, social and environmental fabric of "our little town".

A publicly stated and respected vision for Trentham into the next few decades should be the criteria against which planning, infrastructure and service delivery should be assessed. End "silo thinking", build integrated approaches!"

"I don't mind some more housing, but it must be done correctly.

We are NOT and NEVER should be like the likes of Melton or Tarneit where houses sit on top of each other."

Too many small building lots

I am concerned that the planning process for new housing is less restrictive than in past years. New buildings that do not reflect rural / environmentally low key values are being built. Houses that are more suited to inner city zones detract from the area.

Continued sub-division of land at the level currently being allowed.

I don't want it to become congested with new developments.

Yes being crowded lots of houses now on very very small blocks of land



Yes, somewhat. It appears it is becoming suburban. Axe handled blocks, small block sizes.

Yes. We chose to buy here for 2 main reasons, the "village" community feel and the historic nature of the town. Both aspects are under threat due to developers buying properties to subdivide with no care for heritage, or for the impacts on the residents. They are only interested in making money, certainly not on conserving or enhancing the fabric of the town. A heritage overlay on the town centre should be paramount and future development carefully considered.

Please don't let Property Developers in to destroy our beautiful outdoor areas.

I'm concerned that the town will become too suburbia,

Inconsiderate and poorly planned residential growth because of rushed planning decisions by transient planning staff who do not understand our town. The loss of a valued character which is low density, larger lots, and expansive gardens. We would like to see the incremental and sustainable growth of our vibrant but small village centre. We are first and foremost a small country town.

Yes, I moved from new gisborne because of urban sprawl and green field development. I would like trentham to be a thriving tourist town that keeps its character as there is no other place like it in Victoria.

It will become too suburban and or gentrified.

Yes, subdivisions are becoming ugly

Inappropriate housing on small blocks, the need for suitable small houses. The need for businesses that serve the community not just tourists

The land subdivisions are getting smaller, too many houses on small areas of land make for urban feel in this lovely rural village. Also infrastructure not keeping up. Water, sewerage and power problems increased by dense development.

Building of new homes that do not reflect rural character and design. Example smaller blocks, no covenants on buildings by design.

"There are too many smaller subdivisions.

Also, I have concerns of the Ploughman pub that is always closed and, as it takes up so much street frontage, how it mars the streetscape during community events such as ANZAC Day and Spudfest."

Other

Need for more inner town housing development to allow for affordable housing for a range of ages and household types, while still protecting food bowl agricultural & productive farming land around.

"The lack of business diversity will see the town become just known for B&B stays and not serve the residents.

With so many young families in town will we have enough things for them to do without having to travel long distances for sport and entertainment activities."



I have heard there may be a TAB and sports bar (i.e. betting facilities) coming to a venue in the main street in September. I fear this will change the character of the town, create economic problems for individuals and families and be detrimental to the wider area.

"Corporation invasion

Ie: Maccas/KFC/Bunnings etc"

Trentham has an extraordinary 'involvement' ethos in all sorts of cultural, sporting, community service roles. As newcomers come to Trentham (esp. if there is a considerable number of working residents), I hope this involvement ethos is not lost. Much volunteering is now performed by our over 60 cohort (unsustainable)

That it loses it charm and open spaces. And the farming get sold off for residential.

Native bush land not being replaced when destroyed by storms. Waterways pollution!

Protection of wildlife, and land development's is starting to look like suburbia, that's definitely not good for the town or for the wildlife it will loose the uniqueness of the town.

Environmental impact from humans!

My concerns are the housing availability here there is not enough for the future generations that have lived here there whole lives and wanting to stay here to be close to parents and grandparents

My only concern is it with all future housing the current infrastructure is sewage and water is not sufficient

That it will stay the same forever

Yes I feel as tho the older generation is not allowing the town to naturally grow

Yes - sufficient water, lack of low cost housing (really only the St George units)- which is why some present objections to subdivision are just selfish. The population is aging +median gone up steadily over the decade to 58, 20+ older than Victoria), largely due to mostly well off retirees having enough funds to afford a home.

- " Lack of, and/or lack of maintenance of green spaces in residential areas.
- Too many short term accommodation residents"

I am very concerned about B and B,s that are used as large wedding venues, completely unregulated and hell to live next to. The council needs to do something urgently about these houses, essentially bieng used as function centres. The noise and chaos is not fair.

The current Australia post office in Trentham is amazing, it is like a community hub, the owners are so caring for community members, once the post office is sold I worry about how much of a loss this will be.

Poor planning and the lack of a planning scheme to protect the towns character is the biggest problem. Battle blocks and splitting of existing blocks continues unabated and is destroying the township. If people want tiny blocks they should stay in the suburbs of Melbourne and not come to Trentham to turn into suburbia. Another paradise lost is where Trentham is heading. I'm concerned Trentham gets far too little in return for the rates being paid.

I think the planting of deciduous tree everywhere is horrible and racist.



It's over run by tourists at weekends making parking for locals impossible, poor condition of local roads due to increased traffic flows, poor mix of shops reduces locals shopping there, lack of proper sized supermarket forces locals to shop elsewhere, traffic flow problems caused by lack of adequate parking options and no time restrictions that force parking space turnover, younger generations moving away due to lack of jobs, transport, schools

Growth

"Put a stop on subdivisions in the town. It is losing its rural character.

We are paying the highest rates we have ever paid in a Shire but feel that Hepburn has the least to offer ratepayers. We don't even have a green waste service yet have to still pay to dispose of it at the tip."

Cap the future population and block number, and enforce a minimum size on subdivision. Encourage families to move here, so sporting clubs, schools and community groups continue to prosper. Encourage small businesses to town with a greater range of services and diverse agriculture. Focus on retaining a rural feel to the streetscape.

"Far too much development too quickly.

Get up to date planning regulations NOW PLEASE!"

Please explore ways of ensuring that development in the farm land actually supports productive land use rather than country estates like those found at Mt Macedon and increasingly have snuck in on Pearsons Road.

I understand that as a small rate base Shire, Hepburn is under a lot of pressure to maximise rates from residential properties and also to increase the total number of residences but we, the people who live here, must also have some power as we live with the consequences of ill-considered, developer-influenced decisions.

Block sizes that are consistent with a rural environment not suburban block sizes. Given the depletion of trees, vegetation because of development maybe the council needs to take responsibility for revegetation.

Approval of Battle axe blocks and haphazard development should be questioned.

Stop subdividing everything! Cluttered living does not provide privacy or quiet environments. People move here to have space to grow trees, vegies, have pets or livestock to farm, to be away from neighbours. Subdivision will kill the rural essence of this place

I would like Wolff lane to be protected and a historic and community space. The bakery and the pocket park opposite are fantastic community spaces.

Trentham is a lovely little town, with the shops on the main street and our lovely outdoor areas. The wildlife and other animals need to be protected. The people are very generous and caring. Let's not let 'big town thinking' destroy what we have.

All we got from the last \$215,000 street scape was a few trees on nature strips and the removal of parking spaces outside the Pharmacy, replaced by an uneven footpath and a drain that's always blocked!!! A path to the Trentham Falls still hasn't eventuated. Trentham needs electric vehicle charging points, a waste point for motorhomes and caravans, some overnight powered camping sites and better footpaths. The 'skate park' was only built to half it's original size and needs expanding

We need more affordable housing for people that work here

Monitor and limit air bnbs. When people from outside of the area with no connection to the community buy properties for short stays it limits opportunities for housing for young people, renters, workers to find accommodation

Encourage a more diverse range of business that support weekend tourism.

I would hope that incoming residents do not bring city-style expectations with them but accept they've moved to the country where things may not be perfect!

The population is growing. Suburbs are expanding, or rather growing like bacteria on agar.

I'd like to see less parking in the main street so as to free it up for pedestrians. Drivers often don't obey the road rules and do u turns in the main street or park in no parking zones making it difficult to see where you're trying to turn into and out of the main street. It has become



particularly difficult turning into the main street from Cosmo road as cars regularly park beyond the designated parking spots making visibility difficult.

12. Do you have any further comments about housing in your town?

This is important - I have further comments that don't fit the ridiculous character restrictions including as below. [There is no other obvious place in this survey for this issue, but Council must engage with the community to identify the best use of purchased with a caveat 'for community use'.]

We live at the edge of town near the State Forest. We chose to live up here for the amount of space we have around us and the wildlife we encounter. If you continue to subdivide and let the town sprawl, all character will be gone and it will change the beauty of this town and the reason a lot of people live here. If housing options for people of all stages of life are needed, then keep them close to the town centre where everything is more accessible.

Please stop approving houses on 350m and smaller blocks that are better suited to inner city Melbourne. We live in the forest and the reality is our town can only grow so far...land availability being the least of these issues

It's far too dense. The blocks are smaller and smaller, too many weekenders and B&B's

I'm concerned about the unregulated proliferation of short stay accomodation in the toen, especially if operated by 'out-of-towners'. This severely restricts long term rental options for people. It undermines community efforts for civic beautification (ie do absentee landlords participate in grant writing, planning, working bees etc etc. to enhance and maintain our walking trails, town reserves etc? They certainly financially benefit from the fact that these places exist, attractively maintained.

Unfortunately many of the wealthy newcomers to town seem to be worried about low-income people or "those types people" living near them - this may be a barrier to effectively addressing affordable housing issues.

Would not like to see any major developments happening in town- as I said in question 7. perhaps a small cluster of that would suit older residents or retirees. Am happy for heritage building to be bought up and restored, There are a lot of very tasteful renovations that have been done in the last 4 or 5 years.

* Definitely no more carving up large blocks!!

More options similar to homes next to the library with space for gardens etc. suited to elderly

Preferred neighbourhood character encourages single storey setback in mature gardens, however many lots appear significantly larger than owners occupants have capacity to manage leading to a conclusion that policies need development and promotion for densifying housing withing existing town boundaries using existing service infrastructure with low cost of infrastructure extensions.

Councils all over can't manage what infrastructure and roads they have now. The argument of more houses and more rates will bring councils more money is such a failed argument. More houses will happen with the existing vacant land in the township but Shires could give up unused shire lands to help with social housing. Some Crown land should also be given up to social housing projects. Especially old railway reserves that no longer have railway lines operating unless it can be proved a train service will soon return.

(i) Sporting facilities: one oval and one netball court is totally inadequate for future growth – we need a soccer pitch and, desirably, an indoor basketball / netball court.

NB provision for the future expansion of sporting facilities will require re-zoning some of the (farming zone) land to the west of the existing Sportsground.

Also, Trentham needs a 1/3-size basketball court located somewhere in the centre of town.

(ii) Small community-run space(s) where groups can find 'a home', run on-going activities /services and provide a base with storage etc, in addition to the small Neighbourhood Centre and a new Council-managed Community Centre where space is booked by the hour.

A good model is the Old Church on the Hill (OCH) in Quarry Hill, Bendigo

https://www.theoldchurch.org.au/, which hosts a wide variety of groups and activities. An opportunity to do something similar in Trentham exists in the now defunct Uniting Church facility on the corner of Camp and Market Sts. This site is arguably the last central community-development opportunity in the central township and, incidentally, is effectively part of the



(recently re-signposted) Place of Last Resort.

The Church authorities are keen to sell this property but are allowing community use (currently mainly the Playgroup but many other groups also use it) pending completion of the Community Centre. The Playgroup advise the new Community Centre will not be suitable for their needs which include a huge amount of equipment that is left in place between sessions (otherwise presenting an almost impossible storage challenge). Many people see this site as a community asset created and maintained over time by the local congregation and community. Its sale will see an asset lost to the community and the proceeds of the sale leave Trentham. [Disclaimer; my wife has cared for and managed this property on behalf of the congregation and community for many years and continues in this role under a great deal of uncertainty.]

We have been disappointed with the lack of the arts in Trentham. We need spaces for music and art.

I think current projects will ensure facilities are coming. I think the town square could be far more attractive and appealing than it is. 6. Other comments / suggestions:

Iam concerned thatthis surveydoesn't:

- () take a sufficiently high level overview: it perpetuates an incremental 'growth management' approach without long-term context, including population projections and carrying capacity;
- (i) allow for long-form submissions and the limited opportunities for comment, e.g. none for Business & Economic Development;
- (in) isn't based on neighbourhood character studies; and
- (iv) ask for (optional) contact information raisingserious questions about its seriousness. Council's consultation policy is in my experience a farce- at mostIhave received a generic acknowledgement with an unconvincing assurance that all submissions have been carefullyconsidered no real engagement. (I include my telephonenumber totest this assertion—ref also myseparate e-mail sent tothe address shown on the web-site for this Survey.)
- 13. Furthercomments about housing:

See 8 re a local housing strategy and my concern about lack of context (see 6)

I do have bigger vision for how Trentham might develop with a 2050 horizon and taking account of land & water 'carrying capacity' and associated climate change constraints and the need to consider the smaller satellite settlements which are alsogrowing rapidly - given commercial sensitivity, I intend discussing this with my Ward councillor.

[There is no other obvious place in this survey for this issue, but Council must engage with the community to identify the best use of community use'.)

- 19. Walking could be assisted by:
- (i) ensuring pathways link between otherwise single-point-of access developments to explain: contiguous developments in Manna Lane, off Blue Mount Rd and Mulcahys Rd could have been linked enabling people to walk/ride tens of metres to locations that are more than a kilometre distant via made roadways. (This of
- course wouldrequire Council to forgo the development/subdivision levy it claims as casht o bolsterits precarious financial situation the levy as Iunderstand it is hypothecated for the enhancement of open space which is effectively lost with every additional subdivision.) Note also that Blue Mount Rd and Mulcahys Rd are significant one-way roads, both leading into the forest, with already considerable residential development and more projected- every effort must be made to provide cross-links to increase safety.
- (n) commissioning an extension of the Domino Walking Trail east from the Station to the intersection of the Trentham-Tylden Rd and Daylesford/Falls Rds. This would require a 'drop-in' pedestrian/cycling bridge in place of the derelict Trent Ck bridge. It would serve peopleliving along that section of the rail reserve and provide

for a linear park /biodiversity / urban forestry corridor in place of a largely untended overgrowth (and fire hazard) of blackberries and other weeds. This is a relatively low-cost development that could make a huge contribution to town character as aneast-west natural link to complement the twonorth-south creek reserves leading to the Falls . . . as well as providing for greater pedal & pedestrian mobility.

28. Stories about Trentham and what makes it special: An interesting question and one Iexpect will elicit mostly positive stories- the consultantsmust be careful to resist the temptation of painting a bucolic,



'folksy' picture which could trivialise at o w n that has been through a great deal of change over the past 10-15 years and is growing rapidly (we don't need marketing!)

Taking another perspective, Iwill recount the story told to me by a mother whosefamily are re-locating to one of our nearby major regional centres to provide their 8 and 10 year olds more opportunities when they move into theirteens: "Trentham is agreat place to raise children but when they reach secondary level, unless

they're into football ornetball, there's nothing other than alcohol and drugs." Ihave no basis to assess the accuracy of this claim but Ilament the loss of any youngfamily from our older-than-average community. That

is the basis for a couple of my main priorities - see Qs 35-37. Trentham doesn't even have a basketball 1/3- size court and ring which I've observed elsewhere as great places for youngsters to 'hang out' (such an

addition should be located somewhere centrally in town not at the Sportsground).
