# Sustainable Hepburn Community Engagement Plan



#### **Acknowledgement of Country**

Hepburn Shire Council acknowledges the Dja Dja Wurrung as the Traditional Owners of the lands and waters on which we live and work. On these lands, Djaara have performed age-old ceremonies of celebration, initiation and renewal. We recognize their resilience through dispossession, and it is a testament to their continuing culture and tradition, which is strong and thriving.

We also acknowledge the neighbouring Traditional Owners, the Wurundjeri to the South East and the Wadawurrung to our South West and pay our respect to all Aboriginal peoples, their culture, and lore. We acknowledge their living culture and the unique role they play in the life of this region.

#### **Working with our Traditional Owners**

Dja Dja Wurrung Country covers a large proportion of the Shire's land area, with small portions of both Wurundjeri to the South East and Wadawarrung to our South West. Hepburn Shire Council recognises the importance of a meaningful strategic partnership with our Traditional Owners. This commitment is recognised in our Council Plan at strategy 1.4.4 "Develop a meaningful and strategic partnership with Dja Dja Wurrung to identify and collaborate on our shared environmental priorities."

This commitment will act as our guiding principle as we partner with and strive to enable Traditional Owners to lead and manage Country within Hepburn Shire both during the development and the implementation of the Sustainable Hepburn strategy.

#### **Introduction**

Hepburn Shire is a small rural Shire, located on Dja Dja Wurrung country, the Traditional Owners and custodians of the land, with a population of 16,157. The Shire's population is projected to reach 17,700 by 2036. The Shire covers an area of 1,473 square kilometres which includes Clunes, Creswick, Daylesford, Hepburn Springs, and Trentham, and the villages of Glenlyon, Allendale, Kingston, Leonard's Hill, Lyonville, Newlyn, Denver, and Smeaton, and other smaller settlements, each with their own unique identity and character.

Hepburn Shire has a strong track record of being a forward thinking and innovative community with respect to environmental sustainability. During the Hepburn Together project the community nominated the natural environment as being closely linked to our identity as a community and something that they valued and wanted to see protected. These sentiments are reflected both in our shared Community Vision statement and Focus Area 1 of the Council Plan.

Hepburn Shire - an inclusive rural community located in Dja Dja Wurrung country where all people are valued, partnerships are fostered, environment is protected, diversity supported, and innovation embraced.

## Community Vision 2021-2031

Acknowledging community sentiment during the Hepburn Together consultation process, Council wishes to build a comprehensive understanding of community aspirations, values, challenges and ideas relating to environmental action through the delivery of an extensive engagement process. Together we will create a shared sustainability vision and investigate innovative and practical ways to take action both as a Council and together, as a community.

There are three Hepburn Shire environmental sustainability strategies requiring updating during 2021 including the Waste Management and Resource Recovery Strategy 2014–21, the Biodiversity Strategy 2018–21 and the Towards Zero Emissions Roadmap 2017-21. The **Sustainable Hepburn** project strives to develop an integrated strategy linking key sustainability themes in the strategic narrative, highlighting the interconnection between climate change (emissions reduction, adaptation and resilience), managing waste, and biodiversity. By acknowledging the interconnection between these sustainability themes, we can build capacity within Council as an organisation and together as a community to understand how we fit into the sustainability picture and take meaningful action together.

#### **Focus Area One**

A resilient, sustainable and protected environment – A responsive, adaptive, and resilient community that addresses changes to our climate and biodiversity.

  - Natural environment and biodiversity

- A low waste Shire
- A climate and water resilient Shire

#### **Level of Influence**

The level of influence will range from 'involve' to 'collaborate' on the International Association of Public Participation spectrum. At its highest level we will partner with you to develop alternatives and identify preferred solutions for our shared priorities. We will consider your advice and recommendations to the maximum extent possible.
