#### Acknowledgement of Country



#### Hepburn Together

During 2021 Hepburn Shire Council is embarking on the Hepburn Together project. The project will shape the vision and direction for Hepburn Shire over the next 10 years. We want to hear about your goals, aspirations, and suggestions for the places where you have chosen to live, work or visit. Your input about what you value and what you want to change can guide Council's planning and give priority to future projects.

#### The project includes the development of:

- Our Community Engagement Policy. The policy guides how Council will
  engage with the community, and lets the community know what they can
  expect. It outlines the roles of Council employees and highlights how we
  use community insights in our decision making.
- Our 10-year Community Vision will be an aspirational description of what our community wants for the long-term future of the Hepburn Shire.
- Our 4-year Council Plan (incorporating Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan) will identify the strategic directions and priorities that Hepburn Shire Council will pursue over the course of the next 4 years to meet the community's diverse needs.
- Financial Plan and Asset Plan will outline the prioritised allocation of resources in order to maintain financial sustainability, meet community needs and protect Council's assets.



#### Community Engagement Policy

From the 25 January to the 7 February 2021 over 300 Hepburn Shire citizens contributed to the development of Council's draft Community Engagement Policy. Your input has shaped a policy that will guide Council's community engagement practice and facilitate your participation in the development of important projects, plans and strategies.

One of the important elements of the Community Engagement Policy is Council's commitment to community engagement. Councils commitment includes promises to:

- Ensure community access to engagement processes is as broad as possible.
- Use simple and clear language when we communicate.
- Actively listen without judgement to what people say.
- Respect diverse views and request mutual respect between all parties.
- Value the creativity and expertise of the community in our decision making and problem solving.
- Ensure all contributions are recorded.
- Report back to the community on what we have heard.
- Base the engagement framework on community recommendations to the greatest extent possible.
- Provide feedback on where input has not been incorporated into the outcome and explain the reasons for our decision.
- Measure and assess the effectiveness of our community engagement practices and commit to ongoing continuous improvement and innovation.

Our Community Engagement Policy was adopted at a special Council meeting on 23 February 2021.

#### Stage 3: Broad Engagement

We want to embrace the knowledge, expertise and creativity of the community to shape our future. From the 23 February to the 19 of March 2021, we will explore the community's goals, aspirations and priorities for Hepburn Shire's future. These goals, aspirations and priorities will help us frame our Community Vision, Council Plan incorporating the Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan, Financial Plan and Asset Plan. These findings will be explored in more detail in our deliberative engagement sessions to be held in April 2021.

This discussion guide is broken into two main parts:


- Part 1 considers the Community Vision and asks for your input into identifying our goals, aspirations, and priorities for the next ten years (2021-2031).

  Vision for the next 4 years.




